The Neighborhoods Rising Fund (NRF) provides the support and resources to help neighborhoods realize their dreams. It is because of the NRF's small, impactful grants to neighborhood associations and community organizations that residents are empowered to improve their lives and the lives of those around them.

The NRF would not be possible without the generous contributions of the foundations, banks, CDFIs, and corporations that support this grant program. Their participation in this unique funding collaborative is critical to helping Kansas City neighborhoods achieve their goals and play their part in making Kansas City a great place to live.

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The Neighborhoods Rising Fund (NRF) is a unique funding collaborative that annually provides grants up to \$3,000 for community-driven and neighborhood-led revitalization projects and initiatives in low- to moderate- income areas throughout the Greater Kansas City region.

The NRF, formerly the Neighborhood Self Help Fund, was created with the simple goal of seeding dreams and aspirations in Kansas City neighborhoods. By supporting small, neighborhood-led initiatives that demonstrate the ability to have a lasting impact, the NRF has brought together hundreds of residents and helped to build their collective capacity to live more productive, healthy, and interconnected lives.

Since 2015, the NRF has provided over \$215,000 for 86 community projects and neighborhood revitalization initiatives in Kansas City, Missouri and Kansas. This report highlights projects supported in 2017, the third year of the NRF. The stories and data you will see in this report further demonstrate the critical role of this grant program in helping neighborhoods throughout Kansas City build lasting change.

The continued local impact of the NRF was made possible by the following funders; Hall Family Foundation, Hallmark Corporate Foundation, H&R Block Foundation, AltCap, The Sosland Foundation, Sprint Corporate Foundation, JE Dunn, Commerce Bank, US Bank, and UMB. The NRF IS managed by the Community Capital Fund and Greater Kansas City LISC, two community development non-profits that build the capacity of neighborhoods in distressed areas throughout Kansas City, MO and Kansas City, KS.



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The project leverages NRF grant funds through community resources, strong partnerships, volunteers and other sources of funding and in-kind contributions In <u>2017</u> the NRF awarded <u>\$53,338</u> in grants, aiding <u>23 projects</u> and impacting <u>26,705 residents</u>. These projects leveraged <u>\$39,744</u> in additional funding, <u>\$33,490</u> through in-kind donations and other funding sources as well as <u>9,713 volunteer hours</u>.

For every hundred grant dollars disbursed, an additional \$75 was spent by the grantees on supporting local organizations and residents. Additionally, for every \$100 grant dollars spent, volunteers gave 18.2 hours of their own time to assist with projects.



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### **Missouri Projects**

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In <u>Missouri</u> alone the NRF distributed \$40,806. All together volunteers accumulated 4,693 hours. The Missouri NRF projects impacted a grand total of 23,358 people



### Blue Valley Neighborhood Association Cleanup and Picnic

The Blue Valley Neighborhood Association is working towards a cleaner community by establishing solutions to stop the thousands of pounds of trash and illegal dumping in their neighborhood. Volunteers spent 8 hours clearing trash from the neighborhood block by block and distributing recycle bins to sustain cleanliness long after the day of the clean-up. Later, the neighborhood celebrated their success with a picnic, inviting the entire neighborhood and several community groups. At the picnic, toiletries were distributed to families in need. This project involved local schools, community members, volunteers, church groups to help make their community a cleaner, happier place to live.

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

# Citadel Homeowners Association's Landscaping Maintenance to Common Areas

Citadel's landscaping project has helped to make an attractive, livable neighborhood. Residents appreciate the added beauty and enjoy walking their neighborhood--the project has enhanced the aesthetics of the environment in the neighborhood for all ages. Citadel used the grant to cover the cost of mulch, fertilizer, and soil samples for five common areas. They then planted flowers and saplings and watered them monthly. Having an aesthetically pleasing community also helps to maintain the property values which are important to the residents who are socially and monetarily invested in this community.

### Gregory Ridge's Neighborhood Clean Up, Beautification, and Social Events

Gregory Ridge Homeowners Association used their grant to purchase leaf bags and dumpsters to assist volunteers in cleaning their neighborhood. Flowers and potted plants were planted to further beautify the area. These projects helped establish relationships for youth in the neighborhood. Residents have also become more knowledgeable about the skills and resources in the neighborhood and will be more inclined to utilize local resources to produce additional economic gain to the families in the neighborhood.

## Indian Mound's Year-long Community Engagement Events

Indian Mound's community engagement events were designed to engage residents in a positive environment and to highlight the many assets of our community: parks, businesses, and organizations. The National Night Out event encouraged neighbors to create block watch programs, the Fall Pumpkin Patch event encouraged stewardship of an under utilized park and trail, and the Summer Budd Park activity highlighted local businesses and membership in the neighborhood association.



INC Art brought together artists, historians, and elders to transfer the history of Ivanhoe into art - quilts, music, dance, and the spoken word. An exhibition was held to display the art for the entire community. The event brought forward the community's perspective and voice to build a stronger social fabric and foster livable, safe, and healthy environments.

The Longfellow Community Association expanded the Longfellow Farm with a green space, landscaping, trees, benches, and a community mural (to be completed Spring 2018). This project was a beautification that created an additional community asset. The project creates greater awareness and utilization of beautiful public space available for Longfellow residents. The land was used to educate neighbors about gardening and an informal wiffle ball game was hosted on the newly greened area.

## Lykins Neighborhood Association's Community Awareness Expansion

Lykins Neighborhood Association created outreach collateral including door hangers, yard signs, and a new logo to better engage residents. They collaborated with Mattie Rhodes Center and NEAT, Urban Farming Guys, Solid Waste Management, and KCPD to address the top priorities of Lykins: including strengthening communication, combatting illegal dumping, and increasing strict code enforcements to preserve the quality of life and foster a safe and healthy environment.











"LNA will continue to build neighborhood participation by hosting similar events in the upcoming year, building partnerships in the community (e.g. non-profits, schools, etc.), and creating opportunities for residents to be more involved in LNA. In actuality, we are already moving forward. LNA President Dave Shuck has already met with the Whittier Elementary principal to discuss engaging parents in LNA. Additionally, in response to many developers expressing interest in Lykins at our November meeting, LNA will start a housing committee in the upcoming months to oversee prospective development in Lykins. We intend to continue these efforts."

## Patterson Highlands Neighborhood's Re-beautification Project

Patterson Highlands Neighborhood embarked on a re-beautification project to address overgrowth issues in the community's public spaces. Neighborhood trees, which were planted in the 1950s, were especially in need of trimming for aesthetic and safety reasons but much of the neighborhood, which mostly consists of young families and senior citizens, cannot afford to do this or cannot physically do this on their own. The project supported the association's purpose by helping to maintaining properties, creating a safe environment, and build sustainable relationships with neighbors.



# Douglas/Sumner's Operation Facelift + 2nd Annual Neighborhood Block Party

Douglas/Sumner organized a collaborative neighborhood cleanup between Sumner academy, city departments, KCK housing authority, and its residents. The project culminated with a block party to further engage residents on issues of health and safety. The cleanup created positive interaction between city departments, including codes and police with residents around the improvements made to their community. In addition to engagement, the block party also provided critical information from City and County departments on emergency preparedness with interpreters to translate for non-English speaking residents. ### St. Joseph's Neighborhood Watchdogs' Giving Grove Orchard at St. Margaret's Park

Restoring parks in Kansas City, Kansas has been a priority for citizens in the St. Joseph's Watchdogs neighborhood, which has a high percentage of low-income residents and in which healthy foods are often scarce. The neighborhood invested in a new orchard consisting of 12 fruit trees and a cherry bush. A picnic was held to celebrate the completion of the orchard. St. Joseph's Watchdogs brought together various local groups around this project and around the general betterment of the Park. When the orchard matures, it will provide both healthy food and a space for residents. The St. Joseph's Watchdogs plan to continue this work to improve the park by adding a walking trail and more in the future.
