

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The Neighborhoods Rising Fund (NRF) is a unique funding collaborative that annually provides (micro)grants up to \$3,000 for community-driven and neighborhood-led revitalization projects and initiatives in low- to moderate-income areas throughout Kansas City, Missouri and Kansas City, Kansas. These small grants- with value-added support- help to address issues related to public safety, environment, public health, abandoned and vacant property, and other community needs.

The NRF was created with the simple goal of seeding dreams and aspirations in Kansas City neighborhoods. By supporting neighborhood-ledinitiatives that demonstrate the ability to have a lasting impact, the NRF has brought together thousands of residents and helped to build their collective capacity to live more productive, healthy, and interconnected lives.

Since 2015, the NRF has provided over \$400,000 to 164 community-led neighborhood revitalization initiatives throughout Kansas City, Missouri and Kansas City, Kansas. This report highlights projects supported in 2019, the fifth year of the NRF. The stories and data you will see in this report demonstrate the critical role this grant program plays in supporting neighborhoods' goals to build lasting change.







Every community desires to improve the quality of life of its residents, but many also face adversity on the road to creating change. Kansas City's neighborhoods are creative and skilled in solving problems, mobilizing volunteers, and building strong networks. Yet too often, a lack of access to funding sources prevents them from bringing their ideas to fruition. The Neighborhoods Rising Fund (NRF) provides critical funding support to help neighborhoods leverage their residents' talents and energy to realize their collective dreams and make a positive impact.

By providing small grants to neighborhood associations and community organizations, the NRF empowers residents to improve their lives and the lives of those around them. The NRF is made possible through the generous contributions of the foundations, banks, CDFIs, and corporations that support this one-of-a-kind grant program. Their participation in this unique funding collaborative is critical to helping Kansas City neighborhoods achieve their goals and play their part in making Kansas City a great place to live.







Foxtown East Neighborhood Association comleted a series of beautification projects throughout the neighborhood. They obtained acces to mow several vacant land bank lots, and cleaned up the waste from several lots through a series of six cleanup events. They also landscaped and planted a Jazzy Fox and Peaceful Town landscaping rose garden. Lastly, they plaed an updated neighborhood sign in a prominent place, spreading awareness of a positive neighborhood identity. More than 300 people have benefited from the neighborhood cleanups. The beautification efforts of Foxtown East residents has increased neighorhood pride and has discouraged illegal dumping in the area.

Longfellow Community Association hosted a series of projects to strengthen and beautify their neighborhood. 




Rosedale Development Association
